According to the latest research from the Mountain Trade Network (MTN), 42 per cent of British skiers state that price significantly impacted their plans last winter - a three-year high. It has never been more important, then, for operators to offer not only competitive prices, but also value to their customers. The podium this year demonstrates the lengths to which businesses are going to encourage Britons to hit the slopes.

For the third time running - having been named best ski operator in 2019 and 2023 - French specialist Peak Retreats took the top spot, proving the enduring popularity of self-catered ski holidays. The operator now offers packages to more than 70 French resorts, ranging from traditional off-the-beatentrack villages to high-altitude favourites. It continues to expand its portfolio too, with new accommodation options in Serre Chevalier featuring a wellness centre, snow-sure rooms in Tignes and ski-in/ski-out access in La Rosière for winter 2025/26.

Second place went to all-inclusive specialist Club Med, now 75 years old. It's easy to comprehend the appeal of an operator that includes meals, drinks, accommodation and travel in its headline price, but also ski essentials too, such as lift passes and lessons. Neilson completes the line-up this year, an oper-ator that has been taking Britons to the slopes for more than four decades.
